Université Laval. On annonce la nomination de Jacques Mathieu au poste de directeur du département d'histoire. Auger a été promu professeur agrégé et Patrick Baker professeur adjoint (histoire grecque). Jean Du Berger et Jean-Roch Perron ont pris leur retraite. Jacques Lacoursière est le professeur invité pour l'année 1998-1999. Le professeur Jean Hamelin est décédé le 15 mai 1998. Le corps professoral du département a subi des diminutions de l'ordre de 10%.

NEWS FROM THE **DEPARTMENTS**

Gerrit Gerrits of Acadia has been promoted to the rank of Associate Professor. Tenure-track: Paul Doerr, History of 20th-Century Europe. There has been no change in the number of history professors in the History Department.

At the University of Alberta Jane Samson (British History); Ryer Dunch (Asian History); Aara Suksi (Classics) have been appointed to tenure-track positions. Term appointments: John Harris (Classics); Herman Pontes (Classics); Andrew McDonald (British History); John Kitchen (Medieval History); and Galen Perras (Canadian History). Expected: an appointment in Ancient Art and Archaeology. Invited professors 1998-99: John H. Thompson of Duke University; Dr. Kruglashov of Russia. On leave: D.J. Hall, J.-P. Himka, D.R. Marples, and N. Wickender, from July 1998 until June 1999. Retiring: A.M. Small, C.M. Small, and R. Hamowy. Andrew Gow has received a Teaching Award. Faculty numbers have remained steady.

Augustana University College's Lucille Marr has been promoted to Associate Professor. Don Myrehaug is retiring. The Department of history has lost faculty positions.

Michael J. Olin of Bishop's has been promoted to the rank of professor. Term appointments: Cynthia Fish (Canadian History) and Robert Whitney (American History).
