In Memoriam

The ethnohistorian Dr. Alfred Goldsworthy Bailey died on 21 April 1997, at the age of 92. Dr. Bailey held a BA from UNB and an MA and PhD from the University of Toronto. He joined the University of New Brunswick in 1938 and retired in 1970, was the Founder and Head of the Department of History (1938-), Honorary Librarian (1946-), Dean of Arts (1946-50), Professor and Founder of the Department of Anthropology (1956-) and Vice-President Academic (1966-). He taught courses in History, Anthropology, Sociology, Psychology, Political Science and Economics. He was an adviser to Lord Beaverbrook, and to University President Colin McKay. He was a founder of the Fiddlehead and served on the Advisory Board of Acadiensis; he served on the Historic Sites and Monuments Board and other national and regional organizations advancing the cause of scholarship; and he was a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada. He was Professor Emeritus of History and held three honorary doctorates, including one from McGill. He was an Officer of the Order of Canada and one of his six books of poetry was short-listed for the Governor General's literary award (1981).

Studies and work in various disciplines "confirmed Bailey's sense of history as a fluid web of interactions rather than a single story." He was among the first historians to promote the study of regional history in Canada. But it is as an ethnohistorian and poet that he is most likely to be remembered. His great scholarly work, *The Conflict of European and Algonkian Cultures* (1937 and 1969), explained the complex change in Native ways of life during the first two centuries of contact in North America, and had a great impact on its successors in the field. His students deeply admired Dr. Bailey. Generations of them marvelled at his breadth of vision. The best of them sought to emulate him.

Douglas Cole, professor of history at Simon Fraser University for three decades, died suddenly in August 1997. A leading expert in Aboriginal cultures of the Northwest Coast, he was the author of *Captured Heritage* and, with Ira Chaikin, *An Iron Hand Upon the People*, among numerous other publications. Just before his death Doug had completed the first volume of a projected two- volume biography of the pioneer ethnographer Franz Boas.
